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President's Message

“Back to normal” is the catch phrase we seem to hear most often since restrictions have been lifted after Covid. This is a welcome message. The museum has removed the yellow tape from the mud wagon for visitors to once again climb aboard to take pictures and enjoy a fantasy ride. The mask sign has been removed and hand sanitizer is optional. The coffee grinder is moved to where it can grind again and paper items can be picked up for reading. Visitors can sign our register and add comments.

These are small steps, but they add up to an even better museum visit. From a docent’s point of view, the one thing that stands out for me is that with our “new look,” visitors spend more time at exhibits as well as reading descriptions. Our exhibits are always works in progress, and the committee’s goal is to always add or subtract for better visitor interaction.

The new Kumeyaay exhibit is in a positive state of flux. New artifacts will be displayed under

plexiglass, while others will be added in the showcase. An interactive video monitor will feature historical maps and Kumeyaay history.

Exhibit upgrades include a new updated metal timeline installed outside on the patio to entice visitors inside or to give them a glimpse of what’s inside the museum when we are closed. Our Bernardo store exhibit has a new weathered wood stain to give it an old identity. A few new household items have been added to the store and an antique National cash register sits on the wine barrel.

The interactive Wall of Honor video monitor is in its last tweak before use. The Wall of Honor photos in frames will be removed from the Research Library wall and placed in a binder for visitor viewing. The wall will then feature a tribute to Maj. Abraham Baum along with military service jackets representing four branches.

In April, a group from Laguna Woods in Orange County toured the winery and our museum. In an email to the winery, the tour guide said our museum was the best local museum they had seen in Southern California.

So to all the members, donors and volunteers who contribute to the museum’s success, this accolade means you can be justifiably proud.

RB History - A Look Back at Lake Hodges Crossings

Before I-15, Rancho Bernardo and Escondido were connected by Inland Mission Road, which became State Route 77 in 1931 and was renamed Highway 395 in 1934. That road crossed Lake Hodges on a bridge erected in 1919. In the early 1920s a structure was built at the Rancho Bernardo entrance to the bridge that was first called the Lake Hodges Station Store, then the Lake Hodges Pavilion.

Nick and Shirley Buskirk, in their 1993 book, *Escondido: Then and Now*, refer to the pavilion as a popular dancing spot. “It was also a busy fishing camp with a boat dock, cabins and other facilities.”

A major remodel occurred in 1924, according to the Daily Times Advocate: “The dining room will face the lake and will be cooled by the breezes sweeping across the waters,” according to the article. The dance floor was expanded to hold “more than 200 couples.” A “first class kitchen” was being added to offer chicken dinners “on Sundays, dance nights or by appointment” with “regular short order service” during the week.

A five-piece jazz band from San Diego, “Jordan’s Harmony Boys,” provided the music on opening night at the pavilion.

Manager John Daley ran the pavilion from the mid-1920s until his death in 1943. In addition to the

store, dance hall and lunch counter, the property included living quarters for the manager’s family

“It was a great place to grow up,” said John Daley, Jr. “Highway 395 ran right across the front of our house and the lake was behind it. Traffic was nowhere near what it’s like today.”

Before his death in 2008, Bernardo Winery owner Ross Rizzo recalled riding a horse from the family winery down to Lake Hodges to visit his friend, Donald Blunt, whose father Herbert was the pavilion’s manager in the late 1940s and early 1950s.

Rizzo remembered fisherman coming down from San Diego with their families and staying at the cabins. They would catch the fish and “pan fry them right out there” on the lakeshore. “The kids would pitch lines in the lake. The more people came the more kids there were, getting acquainted. It was good old family fun.” According to the Buskirks’s book, *Escondido: Then and Now*, the area where the pavilion once stood was “covered over when the freeway to San Diego was realigned in 1952.” That spot now lies underneath the entrance ramp for I-15 off Pomerado Road.

After a very long time away, our archives group is once again meeting, this time on Thursday mornings, to get back to caring for RB's history. We've been shut down since March 2020.

Our obituary indexing project is back and we have caught up on our clippings files. This includes a folder devoted exclusively to stories on the pandemic, including the weekly count that appeared in the RB Journal so a future researcher can see how the pandemic affected our community.

We have begun a shelf inventory. This is something we usually do in January-February. This means reviewing everything on our shelves in the archives and comparing it to what we have on a spreadsheet to make sure everything is still where it's supposed to be so we can find it quickly.

We are putting together a binder of news articles and programs to go with the Symphony on the Green exhibit.

Lastly, we continue to add donated items to the collection and catalog them. Here is a list of new items we've received since the beginning of the year

Our Need

With annual expenses of \$30,000 plus, including rent, insurance, utilities, advertising and repairs, but no salaried employees, RBHS is planning a new course of action. In the past, we have relied on membership, donations, and events to keep our heads above water. With the pandemic, we had to be closed, and as you know, events were out of the question.

Liz Mallarkey

Liz grew up on a farm in Bear Creek, Wisconsin and attended the University of Wisconsin – La Crosse, graduating with a degree in physical education and a minor in history. She taught and coached in Prairie du Chien, Wis. for seven years. Employed in the Athletic Department of Ohio State University, she was assistant to the Women's Athletic Department and assistant coached women's gymnastics. She also wrote a teaching curriculum for teacher education students in school-age gymnastics. After receiving a Masters+ degree in sports management, she headed women's gymnastics at her alma mater and taught in the Physical Education Department. Within three months she was selected as the Interim Associate Athletic Director, later becoming the permanent Associate Athletic Director.

Five years later, Liz decided to move to San Diego, escaping the Wisconsin winters. After coaching at a gymnastics school in Clairmont her soon-to-be husband, Rob Bryson, talked her into opening their own gym. Gymnny Kids was born. They will be celebrating their 34th birthday this coming September and now employ over 50 people in an 18,000 sq. ft. building, serving about 3,000 students each week aged 9 mos to adult.

A Rancho Bernardo resident since 1977, Dr.




